The 2008 International Maple Symposium in Japan: 12th-14th November 2008

The 2008 International Maple Symposium will take place at the Kawaguchi Centre in the Saitama Prefecture, just a few miles north of Tokyo, on November 12th–14th. This will be followed by two post-symposium tours – the Tochigi Prefecture tour on the 14th–15th November and the Kyoto tour on the 16th–18th November.

Symposium: 12th-14th November

The symposium topics and speakers will include:

New Japanese Maples by Dr Yokoi. Native Maples of Japan by Mr Murakoshi. Propagation of Japanese Maples by Mr Kawahamada. Budding and Selection Work in Acer by Dr R.Olsen. American Maples and their Asiatic Counterparts by

D.Hinkley.

Arrangements are also in progress for a Chinese speaker on the Native Chinese Maples, a speaker on Maple Species in Europe and, possibly, one other speaker.

The Kawaguchi City and Saitama City areas form a very old plant nursery district which used to be known as Angyo since at least the 1600s – the Japanese have been practicing horticulture for more than a thousand years. This district houses numerous nurseries growing a wide diversity of plants, including some maple specialists. Local tours during the symposium may include visits to the old Kobayashi and Tsukasa Nurseries, both famous for maple cultivars.

Post-symposium tours

14th-15th November

A tour of Nikko and the nurseries and natural areas in the Tochigi Prefecture, NNW of Tokyo. It will include visits to the hot springs, the beautiful Togoshu temple, and to maples in the wild in the mountainous national park.

16th-18th November

A visit to the old city of Kyoto, world famous for its old temples and gardens. It involves travelling on the Shinkansen, the bullet train, and seeing the native maples growing in the mountain areas near the city.

Accommodation

Costs

Symposium Registration: \$100

Accommodation: \$160 per night per room bed and breakfast (\$80 per person for double occupancy).

Tochigi Tour: \$200-250 per person, inclusive of hotel and transport. Kyoto Tour: \$300-400 per person, inclusive of hotel and transport *Note:* It is uncertain at the moment, if these costs include meals.

Flights



'Hanburyana': Periodical devoted to horticultural taxonomy and nomenclature

'Hanburyana' is a relatively new magazine produced by the Royal Horticultural Society Botany Department. It is devoted to horticultural taxonomy and nomenclature and, in some ways, aims to fill the gap left by the discontinuation of 'Baileya'. The first volume was published in March 2006. Volume 2 contains proposals to amend the **International Code of Nomenclature for Cultivated Plants (ICNCP)**, discussed at the 5th Symposium on the Taxonomy of Cultivated Plants last October, *Hydrangea cultivar* registrations for 2001–2005, articles on the cultivated forms of *Empatorium cannabinum*, the correct name for *Fittonia albiensis* 'Nana', and descriptions of all plants which have received awards from the RHS in 2006.
